

CCP Review FAQs

Why do I need to participate in the CCP review?

Each year, RNs and RN(NP)s are randomly selected to participate in the CCP review. The review is a supportive process and is not disciplinary in nature. Participating in the review assures the public that you are committed to maintaining and improving your competence as an RN or RN(NP) as part of your legislated requirements.

How does the review support my practice?

Your nursing practice makes a difference and we want to give you the tools to do so. When participating in the review, you empower your clients and colleagues by asking for feedback on your practice. It also gives you the opportunity to demonstrate your commitment to lifelong learning.

Can I be selected to participate in the review more than once?

Yes. The selection of participants is random each year.

How do colleagues and clients provide feedback on my practice?

How do I know if my practice is considered clinical or non-clinical?

If you're selected for the review, you're also required to complete multi-source feedback. Part of that process involves handing out questionnaires to colleagues and clients in clinical or non-clinical settings. Ask yourself questions like:

- Where do I spend the majority of my practice?
- Do I provide direct care to clients or not?

If most of your work (i.e. over 75%) is spent directly with clients, your practice would likely be clinical. It may be helpful to review the <u>CCP Workbook</u>.

What happens if I don't successfully complete the review?

Your self-development plan needs to provide sufficient evidence that you completed a self-directed learning activity to enhance your practice. You will also need to demonstrate that you engaged in multi-source feedback. If these do not occur, there are a few different outcomes that can occur and you can see them here.

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
